Sh. Sat Paul Mittal started his political career as a student activist, focusing on issues concerning the youth. In 1964, he was elected to the Punjab Legislative Council and later served as the Deputy Minister for Home in Punjab. He was elected to the Rajya Sabha for two terms, from 1976 to 1988. In recognition of his contributions to public causes, the President of India later nominated him as a member of the Rajya Sabha.

He served in numerous leadership roles, including as Chairman of the Indian Association of Parliamentarians on Population & Development (IAPPD) and Founder of the Asian Forum of Parliamentarians on Population & Development (AFPPD). His worldwide recognition for promoting ideas on population control and peace led to him being awarded the prestigious United Nations Peace Medal in 1987. Prime Minister Shri P. V. Narasimha Rao described him as a man of very strong will, passionately involved in population and development activities. He is remembered for his significant contribution to the parliamentary movement by promoting awareness of population and human survival issues.

Dr. Walson, Chair of the Department of International Health at the Bloomberg School, is a physician with extensive experience in pediatrics, infectious diseases, and public health. His research focuses on improving child survival and development in Africa and South Asia by investigating poor nutrition and infectious diseases to inform global policy. He co-leads the CHAIN Network, which develops strategies to reduce mortality in acutely ill children, and leads the DeWorm3 study, a large-scale trial across Benin, Malawi, and India focused on climinating common intestinal parasites in communities living in poverty. His work also extends to product development for vaccines, diagnostics, and devices.
